### Dr. Joseph Goldberger

#### From the Archives: July 16, 1874-Jan 17, 1929

#### **Medical Hero**

Dr. Joseph Goldberg's family settled in Perth Amboy from Giralt, Austria-Hungary and lived on the corner of Gordon and State Streets before moving to Wilkes Barre, Pa. Dr. Goldberger blazed medical history by discovering the cause and cure for pellagra, the red death. The good Doctor entered the Public Health Service in 1899 as an assistant surgeon. In 1902 Surgeon General, Walter Wyamn, sent Dr. Goldberger to Tampica, Mexico to study yellow fever. After 5 years he was transferred to New Orleans and became one of the world's authorities on yellow fever, a disease of which he himself nearly died.

Dr. Goldberger grew a reputation as a "health detective". He seemed to have an instinct for detecting the cause of diseases that had baffled others for years. His work proved that both typhus and rocky mountain spotted fever, both insect-born, were separate diseases.

Dr. Goldberger's greatest triumph was the conquest of pellagra. Knowing little about the disease, he set out to learn all he could. He went to cotton-mill towns and fields. He found hundreds of people afflicted with skin lesions, weakness, digestive upsets and mental disturbances.

He studied two orphanages near Jackson, Mississippi, where half the children could be expected to suffer attacks of pellagra each year. Dr. Goldberger began to see patterns in the outbreaks. Although the children's diet was adequate in calorie count, adults received more protein in their foods. The children's diet was largely carbohydrate--corn bread, grits, cane syrup and molasses. Children would consume meat only once per week and high-protein veggies were seldom served. Though Dr. Goldberger arranged for the children to have meat four times a week and the signs of pellagra slowly began to disappear, the idea that the disease was caused by infection remained.

Dr. Goldberger set out to prove that he could produce and cure pellagra by dietary control. He experimented at the Mississippi State Penitentiary, with volunteers who were fed diets common to the region and the rest meat, milk, beans or peas. This showed that those with the protein-rich diet were healthy and the others showed symptoms of pellagra. This still didn't convince the establishment, hence the infection theory remained.

Dr. Goldberger launched another series of experiments using a group of 16, including himself and his wife ,by ingesting contaminated material. None of the volunteers caught pellagra! Finally the establishment was convinced pellagra was caused by a dietary deficiency. At that time vitamins were an unknown, but ultimately it was determined that the deficiency was caused by a lack of vitamin B.
